From the Pastor:

As I work through the Book of Acts for the second time in the last few years in Bible study, I am regularly reminded of a recurring theme. In both the story of Jesus from the Gospel of Luke and in Acts (both authored by the same person that we refer to as "Luke") Luke repeatedly makes the point that God is always guiding Jesus, his disciples, and the early church through the Holy Spirit. God has not and will not abandon his people, no matter what challenges the world may bring.

It is important to remember that assertion from Luke as we recognize that the future of the church, including our congregations, is facing challenges as we look ahead to our immediate future. In general, church membership and participation in our country is declining. There are fewer of us, and consequently often less money, to fulfill the mission that God has set before us. Likewise, there are fewer ordained pastors to fill leadership positions congregations. I suspect it comes as no surprise to you that the church of the next decade will not look like the church of the past ten years. The church, by necessity, is changing.

But change need not mean better or worse. It just means different. And trusting in the guidance of the Holy Spirit, I believe that we must and will change in order to continue the mission of spreading the gospel of the love of God in Christ.

To anticipate and prepare for that change, I believe it is critically important that we be open to new models of being the church. As we have already experienced at Calvary and St. James, the idea of one congregation with one pastor doing all things for all people is unlikely to be sustainable. Rather, it will be necessary for us to work together.

As the people of God at St. James and Calvary, the Holy Spirit has already started us on that path, to the benefit of both congregations. Sharing pastoral leadership, though, I think is just the beginning. There is so much more that we can do together in faithful service to God's mission for us.

To that end, a group of leaders from each congregation has formed a "Vision Team" to begin the dialog of our joint mission. I have challenged those leaders to consider what we can do together in serving God that we might not be able to do alone. A number of ideas have been generated, and as we put some flesh on those ideas you will hear more about them.

As a first, concrete step, we have decided (and the councils have approved) to hold two joint worship services. So, on May 26, Calvary and St. James will worship together at Calvary at 10:30 am. Then, on September 1, we will worship together at St. James at 8:30 am.

The intention of these joint services, and for many of our initial ideas, is to form and strengthen our relationships with one another. As we get to know each other better, I believe the possibilities for ministry together will grow.

Guided by the Spirit, we will meet the challenges before us and not just survive but thrive.

There are two other points that I would like to make regarding this issue.

First, part of what precipitated this discussion between our two congregations is that I anticipate retiring in about 3½ years. At that point, if the Calvary and St. James want to continue sharing pastoral leadership, the relationship between the two will probably need to formalized. Please be assured that this does not mean we are talking about merger. (If you want to know more about what I'm talking about, please ask me.)

Second, there is a similar conversation taking place among the pastors who are serving ELCA

congregations in Moline and Rock Island. As congregations in the Quad Cities, we are also looking for ways that we can share ministry for the benefit of God's mission. I believe we will soon be working to involve our congregational leaders in that discussion as well.

The bottom line: the world is throwing challenges at our congregations. The world, as always, is changing. And so must we. With the Spirit leading us, we will meet those challenges and bring the Word of God to our communities in new and exciting ways.
